Odyssey Visual Diaries

On completion of the first Odyssey quilt, Frances Larder encouraged the Dutch quilters to write their stories, which were then expressed visually into a 'visual diary'. The general consensus at the time was that memories of war, occupation and internment were too painful and emotional to remember and that they would only portray their favourite images and memories of an innocent era.

Thus, in the following selection of visual diaries, you will see early memories of pre-war life in Java, Borneo and Holland, followed by a rich assortment of their first impressions of Australia, mostly in the 1950s.


